

G I Thompson

This home was built on Summit Street by Mr. G. I. Thompson, grandfather of the current owner, Mr. William G. Thompson.

This home has always had meticulous care is essentially the same as when it was built in 1890. The architect, builder and contractor was Mr. C. F. Matthes from Adrian, Michigan.

The architectural style of the home is Queen Ann Sub-style Victorian Period – the age of eclecticism. The home features beautiful stained glass windows, and open oak staircase, a library with cherry woodwork, embossed ceramic tiles on four of the five fireplaces, and the only home in Hudson with a glass roof conservatory attached to the South end of the formal dining room. On the main floor there is a front vestibule, main hall with an open staircase, a library with fireplace, a formal parlor with fireplace, a sitting room, a formal dining room with conservatory, a butler pantry and a large kitchen. The second floor contains five bedrooms, two having fireplaces, two large bathrooms, and a line closet. The third floor contains a full attic and a billiard room.

The house was shingled with metal, interlocking, tern-plated shingles similar to the type used in colonial days. The roof ridge crestings and gable finials are original and intact.
